

Some of these, we hope, will carry forward the Burns heritage as teachers and adult performers of the future - another virtuous circle. # ROSS FINNIE

Ross Finnie became interested in the work of Robert Burns whilst still at school and over the years has attended and spoken at many Burns suppers. A Chartered Accountant by profession, he worked in the financial services sector for twenty nine years during which he was as a director of two merchant banks and then ran his own firm providing corporate finance advice and holding a number of non-executive directorships. Ross is currently a non-executive member of the Water Industry Commission Scotland and of NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde Health Board.

Ross has had a life-long interest in politics. He served as an elected Councillor in Inverclyde for twenty two years (1995 to 1999). He was Chair of the Scottish Liberal Party from 1982 to 1986. In 1999, he was elected as the Liberal Democrat Regional List Member of the Scottish Parliament for the West of Scotland where he served until 2011.

Ross held the position of Cabinet Minister throughout the eight years of the two Liberal Democrat/Labour Coalition Governments, serving as Minister for Rural Affairs (1999-2001) and then as Minister for Environment and Rural Development (2001-2007). As a Cabinet Minister, he was responsible for: piloting eleven Bills through Parliament including the legislation that led to the formation of Scottish Water and the creation of Scotland's first National Parks; setting the first Scottish targets for renewable energy production; and the first-ever Scottish strategies on Sustainable Development, Climate Change, National Waste and Agriculture.

Ross was born in Greenock in 1947 where he still lives. He and his wife Phyl have two grown-up children. He is an ardent rugby supporter and a Past-President of Greenock Wanderers RFC.

# > OBITUARY STUART WALLACE FRIAS ◆

Stuart Wallace died unexpectedly aged 81. Born in Clarkston, in 1930, Stuart attended Eastwood School where his talent for art led to an early resolve to become an architect. He worked as an apprentice at Boswell, Mitchell and Johnston, combined with part time study at The Glasgow School of Art, then transferred to full time study at the Royal College and graduated in 1956, winning both the Gold medal and the Ballahouston Scholarship. This allowed him to travel through Italy and imbued him with a lifelong long of Venice in particular. In his final year, Stuart was elected President of The Architecture Club.

In 1960, Stuart joined Tom Miller's fledgling practice. In 1961, they became partners. Stuart and Tom were soon joined by Bob Burnett. Through the sixties they developed the practice to employ over 50 staff. Following Tom's untimely death, Stuart became senior partner in 1983, continuing in this role untill he retired in 1993. Stuart designed a series of hotels and leisure facilities for Stakis, including the award winning reconstruction of the Grosvenor Hotel and refurbishment of Dunkeld House Hotel. He developed a close friendship with Sir Reo Stakis and designed his house in Dunblane. Other repeat clients included Abbey National, Scottish Brewers, John Dickie and The Royal Bank of Scotland.

Perhaps Stuarts proudest legacy was his sports stadia. His first stand in 1978 for Clarkston RFC was quickly followed by the complete redesign of Ibrox Stadium. This in turn led to new stadia at Murrayfield and the new Den at Millwall FC. This enabled the practice to establish itself as leading specialists in this complex field of design.

Stuart was conscious of his responsibility as an architect to the profession and was a visiting assessor and professional examiner at Strathclyde University. He was elected President of The Glasgow Institute of Architects in 1990.

Stuart was passionate about sport, particularly rugby, initially as a player and thereafter as a long serving President of Clarkston Rugby Club. He chaired the SRU's Visitor

Centre Steering Group and Eastwood Districts Sports Advisory Council. He was a well-known and humorous after dinner speaker on the Scottish Circuit and a very active member of The Bridgeton Burns Club, serving from 1965 to 2012, as variously Director, President and Honorary President. He was also actively involved in "Ye Cronies" and Rhuallan Probus Club.

Stuart always said the positive and committed wholeheartedly to his every endeavour.

A fantastic organiser, talented architect, artist and cartoonist, he brought the gift of constant sparkling wry humour. His friendly demeanor and his capacity to engage with people meant that he made a lasting, warm, impression. He brightened many lives.

Stuart was devotedly married for over 50 years to Audrey who passed away in 2009. He is survived by two daughters, his architect son Scott, their spouses and his nine grandchildren.

# ORIGINS &

#### Bonnie Lass of Ballochmyle

While roving and musing on the Banks of Ayr on a beautiful summer evening Burns spied Whilhemina Alexander, the sister of the laird of Ballochmyle. He thought her one of the fairest pieces of natures workmanship that ever crowned a poetic landscape or met a poet's eye.

On his homeward walk the verses in her honour were composed and Miss Alexander's descendants were so sensible of the immortality conferred by Burns on their kinswoman that they erected a rustic tower at the spot where the meeting took place.

#### Afton Water

Gilbert Burns and Dr Currie disagreed as to the heroine of Afton Water. The former declaring in favour of Highland Mary - the latter espousing the claims of Mrs Stewart of Stair.

The evidence in support of Highland Mary as set forth by Mr W. Scott Douglas is so strong as to be virtually conclusive. Although Dr Currie says the song was presented to Mrs Stewart by the poet in return for her notice, the grandson of that lady states that Afton Water is not among the poems sent to her by Burns.

Mr Douglas concludes - there cannot now be any reasonable doubt that Mary was the subject of Afton Water and that it was composed while she was still alive.

#### Ae Fond Kiss

Ae fond kiss commemorates for all time the final meeting of Burns and Clarinda. Clarinda was about to sail for the West Indies and Burns needed to hurry to see her before she left.

No record of the meeting remains save this lyric and the note written by Clarinda in her journal December 6th 1831 - This day I never can forget, parted with Burns in the year 1791 never more to meet in this world. Oh may we meet in heaven.

The song was sent to the lady by Burns on December 27th on his return to Dumfries.

Of the fourth stanza Sir Walter Scott said it was worth a thousand romances.

Mrs Jamieson declared that these lines are the alpha and omega of feeling and contain the essence of an existence of pain and pleasure distilled into one burning drop.

#### Ye Banks and Braes

The heroine of this song was a niece of Mrs Gavin Hamilton who had loved 'not wisely' but too well.

Burns wished to include the song in his Edinburgh edition but it was judged at the time to be defamatory and the author was forbidden to print under pain of forfeiture of character.





# > SCHOOLS COMPETITION \$

The Bridgeton Burns Club was formed in 1870, and the inaugural Schools Competition was two years later in 1872. The Clubs two constitutional objectives are;

1.To celebrate the anniversary of the birthday of Robert Burns.

2.To encourage and cultivate a knowledge of Scotland's National Bard and also of Scottish history and literature in general, by means of a schools competition within the schools of the East End of Glasgow. The Club has been holding an annual schools competition on the first Friday of December for an amazing 140 years. The Club award appropriate prizes for each of the 32 different categories of the competition at a concert for prize winners. The Concert and Prizegiving will take place in the Woodside Halls on 1st February when 20 trophies will be presented along with 8 silver medals for exceptional performances and £3000 of gift vouchers and cheques.

The 2012 Schools Competition was held on Friday 7th December in St Mungo's Academy where the Club again enjoyed superb support from Head teacher Angela Milton & Marie Birchard, our dedicated liaison teacher along with 22 senior pupils who were employed in various logistical tasks throughout the evening.

The Bridgeton Burns Club had 600 performers at the December schools competition, with an additional 520 Art & 30 Newsdesk competitors, giving us a grand total of 1,150 pupils from a total of 25 East End Glasgow primary and secondary schools.

This year the running costs of the competition and concert will cost £20,000 all of which goes on external services e.g. bus transport, hall & school hire, prizes, office rental & administration. This is a lot of money and can only be raised by the generosity of the people who are here this evening. You are our only source of income so I would most sincerely request that you dig deep in your pockets and support the children and schools of the east end.

The new speechmaking section again received generous direct sponsorship from Aedas Architects and produced another quality crop of entrants.

The Bridgeton Burns Club is hugely indebted to the 150 people who voluntarily support the Schools Competition, without which we would simply not be able to stage the competition. These volunteers are drawn from the directors, past-presidents, friends of the club, from the teaching staff of the participating schools, from the accompanists and adjudicators, from the teachers, and senior pupils of St Mungo's Academy. These are the unsung heroes and heroines on whose efforts the Competition depends.

The Club is delighted that Dr Hilary Rolton has accepted our invitation to attend the Concert; she kindly donated a new trophy in memory of past president Andy Wilkie.

We have the honour and privilege that seven of the prize winners are appearing here tonight to entertain our directors, past presidents, members and guests. Please give them a huge warm welcome and enjoy the wonderful quality of their performances.

The Bridgeton Burns Club's founding fathers would be so proud that the Schools competition is still going strong after 140 years.
