Dear Members and Guests

It gives me great pleasure to welcome you this evening to the 145th Bridgeton Burns Club Anniversary Dinner. Since the Club was founded in 1870, the objectives have been maintained, namely:

 To promote the works of Robert Burns amongst pupils in schools in the east end of Glasgow by holding an annual competition.

• To commemorate the birth of the Bard with a Dinner each year.

The first objective was achieved in style last month when nearly 1000 children between the ages of 5 and 18 took part and your attendance at this Dinner is testament to our success with the second objective.

Looking at our other activities, the Club has had an outing to see the seven statues of Burns between Glasgow and Ayr, there was a visit to the National Library to view the Glenriddell Manuscripts, a visit to Whyte and Mackay, and golf outings to Ralston and Cambuslang. We listened to a wonderful oration by Sir Geoffrey Palmer who provided a fascinating insight into the links between Scotland and Jamaica and provided fascinating background on our Bard. We also had a very successful Hallowe'en Supper at which we were entertained by Taylor Logan and the Trinity High School trio, regarded by many as the stars of the last two Anniversary Dinners.

No Club can stand still and a Forward Thinking Group recommended a number of changes to our working practices. While we still need the support of our Past Presidents, more of the day-to-day running of the Club is being left in the hands of the Directors. In recent months we have moved out of our long-standing office in Bridgeton and all of our work is now done remotely, although it has been necessary to install a new IT system. The cost of running the Competition rises each year and we now have a Board of Patrons who help the Club financially and their generosity means we can continue to ensure that all entrants to the competition have all the support they need. PROFESSOR DAVID PURDIE MD FRCP EDIN. FSA (SCOT)

David Purdie was born privately and educated publicly at Ayr Academy, later graduating in Medicine from Glasgow University. He followed a medical academic and research career, and is a former Clinical Dean of the Leeds University School of Medicine. He concluded his medical life in 2009 in order to concentrate on his academic pursuits in literature.

He is presently one of the 40 Fellows of Edinburgh University's Institute for Advanced Studies in the Humanities, located at The Meadows. This is the great Edinburgh park where the poet's father William Burness worked as a landscape gardiner from 1748-1750, before his final move to Ayrshire. Fellows of the Institute conduct research in the fields of: Classics; Philosophy; European History and English Literature.

Prof Purdie is Editor-in-Chief of the 4th Edition of The Burns Encyclopaedia which covers the life & work of the Poet, his co-Editors being Professors Gerry Carruthers and Kirsteen McCue of Glasgow University. He is also the editor of new editions of Sir Walter Scott's novels Ivanhoe, and The Heart of Midlothian.

He has had a lifelong interest in the Bard since schooldays in Ayrshire and has lectured on the subject as far afield as Paris, Moscow and Washington DC. He is a Hon. Member of the Burns Club of his home town of Prestwick; the Burns Howff Club in Dumfries and the Greenock Burns Club.

In 2000 he and the Rt Hon. Donald Dewar, First Minister, were the principal speakers at the Burns Federation's Millennium Supper in Edinburgh. On Dewar's advice, he now illustrates all his Immortal Memories with the superb images held in our National Archives, which depict the Poet against the background of the Scottish Enlightenment - of which he was one of the brightest morning stars.

Pipe Major SPENCER VEITCH



ORIGINS &

Bonnie Lass of Ballochmyle

While roving and musing on the Banks of Ayr on a beautiful summer evening Burns spied Whilhemina Alexander, the sister of the laird of Ballochmyle. He thought her one of the fairest pieces of natures workmanship that ever crowned a poetic landscape or met a poet's eye.

On his homeward walk the verses in her honour were composed and Miss Alexander's descendants were so sensible of the immortality conferred by Burns on their kinswoman that they erected a rustic tower at the spot where the meeting took place.

Afton Water

Gilbert Burns and Dr Currie disagreed as to the heroine of Afton Water. The former declaring in favour of Highland Mary - the latter espousing the claims of Mrs Stewart of Stair.

The evidence in support of Highland Mary as set forth by Mr W. Scott Douglas is so strong as to be virtually conclusive. Although Dr Currie says the song was presented to Mrs Stewart by the poet in return for her notice, the grandson of that lady states that Afton Water is not among the poems sent to her by Burns.

Mr Douglas concludes - there cannot now be any reasonable doubt that Mary was the subject of Afton Water and that it was composed while she was still alive.

Ae Fond Kiss

Ae fond kiss commemorates for all time the final meeting of Burns and Clarinda. Clarinda was about to sail for the West Indies and Burns needed to hurry to see her before she left.

No record of the meeting remains save this lyric and the note written by Clarinda in her journal December 6th 1831 - This day I never can forget, parted with Burns in the year 1791 never more to meet in this world. Oh may we meet in heaven.

The song was sent to the lady by Burns on December 27th on his return to Dumfries.

Of the fourth stanza Sir Walter Scott said it was worth a thousand romances.

Mrs Jamieson declared that these lines are the alpha and omega of feeling and contain the essence of an existence of pain and pleasure distilled into one burning drop.

Ye Banks and Braes

The heroine of this song was a niece of Mrs Gavin Hamilton who had loved 'not wisely' but too well.

Burns wished to include the song in his Edinburgh edition but it was judged at the time to be defamatory and the author was forbidden to print under pain of forfeiture of character.

7 Statues of Robert Burns

The day culminated with a visit to the Robert Burns Birthplace Museum in Alloway, followed by a hearty dinner and excellent harmony. A special thanks goes to Past President Charlie Newlands and his wife June for a well organised and extremely entertaining event.



Glenrridell Manuscripts

Secretary Iain Gordon and Hon Vice President, Ian Macpherson led a small delegation to the National Library of Scotland (NLS) in Edinburgh to view the fascinating 'Glenriddell Manuscripts' which were on public display 100 years after they had returned to Scotland.

Director Bobby Shaw, along with Bridgeton Burns Club member, John Hutcheson, joined the party for a wee day in the capital to view these prestigious scripts.

The manuscripts, which include 27 letters and 50 poems written by Robert Burns, including Holly

Willie's Prayer, had a very interesting journey from Dumfries to Liverpool before they were controversially sold to the USA in 1913 for the sum of £5000 about £330,000 in today's money. Fortunately they were bought by John Gribbel from Philadelphia. Gribbel was a Burns enthusiast and under specific instructions he very generously gifted them back to the people of Scotland in 1914.

The intrepid four from Bridgeton Burns Club had a wonderful time at the NLS, thoroughly enjoying the magnificent display of the Bard's work.

On the Bard Slot

The 'On the Bard Slot' is a popular section of the Bridgeton Burns Club Board meeting, where a board member or invited guest offers a short lecture or presentation of a subject that has a Robert Burns connection. In September we were graced by the presence of Professor Sir Geoffrey Palmer O.B.E, who lived in Jamaica until the age of 14. Professor Palmer is a distinguished researcher of the highest quality and is currently the Professor Emeritus of the Grain Science at Heriot Watt University. He provided a very informative insight on the development of Glasgow as a City, the significance of the slave trade, the wealth of a number of Glasgow merchants and how this affected and influenced Robert Burns. His fascinating




speech touched on the wealth and influence of those merchants who made a great impact on the city, so much so that streets such Wilson Street, Dunlop Street, Glassford Street, and Buchanan Street and others were named after those merchants. His knowledge of the works of Burns was clear throughout the hour-long presentation, and he offered an interpretation, that Burns would have had, in those years, how money was made in Jamaica. A special thanks to the President for this event.

100 Years of tradition

Earlier this year, member Alex Waddell was chatting with a friend, Duncan McLaren, and 'waxing lyrical' about the Burns Club, and the kids' competition. It transpired that a 'family' copy of the Complete Works of Burns had been inherited from Duncan's parents and contained a prize certificate from the Bridgeton Burns Club inside the front cover. As you can see, the prize was awarded in 1915 to Catherine McLaren of Strathclyde Public School. The recipient was Duncan's Aunt Cathie, who was born in 1903 and died in 1989. For very many years she was the Registrar at the High School of Glasgow, thus, there may be a number of former pupils among the readers of the brochure who will remember 'Miss McLaren' in that capacity. Once again this is another poignant part of the history and tradition of this great Burns club.

The Bridgeton Burns Club was formed in 1870, and the inaugural Schools Competition was two years later in 1872. The Clubs two constitutional objectives are:

1.To celebrate the anniversary of the birthday of Robert Burns.

2.To encourage and cultivate a knowledge of Scotland's National Bard and also of Scottish history and literature in general, by means of a schools competition within the schools of the East End of Glasgow. The Club has been holding an annual schools competition on the first Friday of December for an amazing 142 years. The Club award appropriate prizes for each of the 32 different categories of the competition at a concert for prize winners. The Concert and Prizegiving will take place in the Woodside Halls on 13th February when 20 trophies will be presented along with 7 silver medals for exceptional performances and £4000 of gift vouchers and cheques.

The 2014 Schools Competition was held on Friday 5th December in St Mungo's Academy where the Club again enjoyed superb support from Head teacher Angela Milton & Marie Birchard, our dedicated liaison teacher along with 27 senior school pupils and the two daughters of PP Ian Lightbody who were employed in various logistical tasks throughout the evening.

The Bridgeton Burns Club had 500 performers at the December schools competition, with an additional 910 Art & 15 Newsdesk competitors, giving us a grand total of 1,425 pupils from a total of 22 East End Glasgow primary and secondary schools.

This year the running costs of the competition and concert will cost £20,000 all of which goes on external services e.g. bus transport, hall & school hire, prizes, office rental & administration. This is a lot of money and can only be raised by the generosity of the people who are here this evening. You are our only source of income so I would most sincerely request that you dig deep in your pockets and support the children and schools of the east end.

The Bridgeton Burns Club is hugely indebted to the 150 people who voluntarily support the Schools Competition, without which we would simply not be able to stage the competition. These volunteers are drawn from the directors, past-presidents, friends of the club, from the teaching staff of the participating schools, from the accompanists and adjudicators, from the teachers, and senior pupils of St Mungo's Academy. These are the unsung heroes and heroines on whose efforts the Competition depends.

We have the honour and privilege that six of the prize winners are appearing here tonight to entertain our directors, past presidents, members and guests. Please give them a huge warm welcome and enjoy the wonderful quality of their performances.

The Bridgeton Burns Club's founding fathers would be so proud that the Schools competition is still going strong after 142 years.
