

JIM SHIELDS

Jim is Past President of the Robert Burns World Federation, where he also served as marketing director and finance director and is currently President of Edinburgh and District Burns Clubs Association. He originates from Ayr where Burns was born and grew up with Burns all his childhood. He sung for twenty five years with the Edinburgh Festival Chorus, but the songs of Robert Burns are his over-riding passion and he has had three of his

own compositions published in the International Burns Chronicle over the past six years. His travels to perform Burns have seen him from the sub Tropics of Savannah, to the frozen wastelands of Alberta and from performances in the House of Lords, to corporate events in Aberdeen, from Madrid to Minishant.



NIVEN RENNIE

Niven Rennie is an accomplished after dinner speaker, much in demand on the Burns Supper circuit, and a regular speaker at sports dinners, charity events and awards nights. His performances are always entertaining as he draws on his wide repertoire of humour and witty observations many of which are inspired from his thirty year career as a police officer in the West of Scotland.

Niven was born in Greenock, raised in Dunoon and Educated in Dumbarton. He now lives in Doonfoot, Ayr, a mile from Burns Cottage.

An active member and twice past President of the Ayr Fort Players amateur dramatic group, Niven has played many parts on stage including that of Basil Fawlty when the Fort Players performed 'Fawlty Towers' at Ayr Gaiety Theatre in 2004 and again in 2006 – the first person ever to play this famous role on stage. More recently he has directed a number of plays including 'Noises Off', 'No sex Please we're British' and 'Stepping Out'.

A former member of Cowal Rugby club and Strathclyde Police Rugby Club, Niven also coached at Prestwick Football Club for 10 years but has hung up his boots and is now a keen golfer as well as an avid sports follower from his armchair!

Graham is a Primary School teacher who is from Helensburgh. A former Fulbright scholar, Graham's teaching about Robert Burns and Scotland has been featured at a number of Education Scotland showcases throughout the country.


It was once again an enjoyable evening, and we thank the Adjudicators for all that they do for us, the Competition simply could not happen without them.

Covington Mains Farm, Near Biggar Wreath Laying Service.



Robert Burns en route to Edinburgh stopped overnight at Covington Mains Farm near Biggar on the 27th of November 1786. He was expected and the farmer Archibald Prentice made sure all the neighbours knew of Burns arrival by flying a white sheet from the highest haystack. That evening in Burns own words "There was 'a most agreeable little party in the evening". Burns returned one year later thanking all who made him most welcome.

To commemorate the event Lanarkshire Association of Burns Club erected the Memorial Cairn and hold an annual Wreath laying Service. The Wreath Laying Party was lead by the President

of the Robert Burns World Federation Dr Peter Hughes MBE. He was accompanied by Eileen Logan Lord Provost and Deputy Lord Lieutenant of South Lanarkshire Council who also delivered a speech congratulating the Lanarkshire Association for the continuing good work in maintaining the Schools competition in the County. The Senior Vice-President of the Robert Burns World Federation Bobby Kane took part in the ceremony.

Peter Hughes delivered a eulogy of Robert Burns visit to Covington Mains Farm to a gathering of members of various Burns Clubs both within and outside Lanarkshire.

Bridgeton Burns Club President Andy McArthur attended and carried Fraternal Greetings from the Club. Following the service the party retired to the Tinto Hotel, Tinto for a High Tea including entrainment from school children who competed in the Lanarkshire Association of Burns Clubs Schools Competition.

'Nae Man Can Tether Time or Tide'



Earlier this year Mr Bill Cunningham sent Club Secretary, Iain Gordon, a couple of programmes relating to the Anniversary Dinner of the Bridgeton Burns Club in 1965 and the Centenary Dinner in 1970 hosted by the Corporation of the City of Glasgow. Both programmes had belonged to his late father-in-law.

The 95th Anniversary Dinner was held at 'The Grosvenor' on the 25th January 1965, Chaired by the Club President, William R. Walker. Interestingly, 'the Nicht's Ongauns' reveal a very busy evening, like our own tonight, the slight difference being that pound in your pocket would have bought you several pints of beer or 15 pints of milk if you prefer.

One name on the Board of the Club at that time was Jack House, the author and broadcaster who was affectionately known as 'Mr Glasgow'.

The 1970 programme was a reception for the Club to mark the Centenary year and was held in the City Chambers hosted by the Right Hon, The Lord Provost, Donald R. Liddle, Esq., J.P. The Club President was James Struthers. There was a glaring spelling error on the front of the programme 'the Cententary' although in fairness spellcheck was yet to be invented.

Our three Senior Office Bearers, Hon. President Bob Burnett, Hon Vice-Presidents Allan Findlay and Ian Macpherson were among some of the current Board who were at both Dinners whilst others on the Board, like the Secretary, were still at Primary School and some were yet to be born.

Time passes quickly gentlemen or as the Bard would say;

But pleasures are like poppies spread, You seize the flower, its bloom is shed; Or like the snow falls in the river, A moment white--then melts for ever;'

The Bridgeton Burns Club was formed in 1870, and the inaugural Schools Competition was two years later in 1872. The Clubs two constitutional objectives are;

- 1. To celebrate the anniversary of the birthday of Robert Burns.
- 2. To encourage and cultivate a knowledge of Scotland's National Bard and also of Scottish history and literature in general, by means of a schools competition within the schools of the East End of Glasgow. The Club has been holding an annual Schools Competition on the first Friday of December for an amazing 145 years. The Club award appropriate prizes for each of the 32 different categories of the Competition at a concert for prize winners. The Concert and Prize-Giving will take place in the Woodside Halls on 24th February when 20 trophies will be presented along with silver medals for exceptional performances and £3000 of gift vouchers and cheques. The schools put these funds to great use.

The 2016 Schools Competition was held on Friday 2nd December in St Mungo's Academy where the Club again enjoyed superb support from Head Teacher Angela Milton, and Marie Birchard our dedicated liaison teacher, who, along with 40 senior pupils, and the fantastic facilities management team, really helped the events run smoothly on the night.

The Bridgeton Burns Club had over 460 performers at the December Schools Competition, with over an additional 987 Art & News-Desk competitors, giving us a grand total of over 1,400 entrants from East End Glasgow primary and secondary schools.

Every participant received a medal on the night for taking part, and it was heartening to see so many happy young faces after the Competition, having performed so well, and enjoyed doing so; and to know that, with the support garnered from your donations at our Dinner tonight, we can make nearly half a thousand and more youngsters happy this year too.

The Schools Competition Committee is continually looking to improve on the quality and scope of what the Competition delivers for participants, this year commencing the introduction of better-aligning our feedback to schools and children with the Curriculum for Excellence. The Committee's first priority is always on what will enhance the enjoyment of the Competition for our young participants.

This year the running costs of the Competition and Concert individually will cost well over £20,000, inceasing every year, despite the best efforts and prudence of the Schools Competition Committee in reviewing and seeking to reduce any cost which does not affect the children, and all of which goes on external services e.g. bus transport, hall & school hire, prizes, catering for participants accompanists and adjudicators, and administration. This is a lot of money and can only be raised by the generosity of the people who are here this evening. You are our only source of income so I would most sincerely request that you dig deep in your pockets and support the children and schools of the east end. Every penny you can spare is needed! The Bridgeton Burns Club is hugely indebted to the 150 people who voluntarily support the Schools Competition, without which we would simply not be able to stage the Competition. These volunteers are drawn from the directors, past-presidents, friends of the club, from the teaching staff and helpers of the participating schools, from the accompanists and adjudicators (some of whom are former competitors). These, along with the aforementioned staff and pupils at St Mungo's Academy, are the unsung heroes and heroines on whose efforts the Competition depends.

A special note of thanks this year, once again, goes to the great people at Thomas Tunnock Ltd., a family business since 1890, who generously donated over 600 Tunnock's Caramel Wafers as a treat to include in the healthy snack packs given to each participant. Warmly received and enjoyed by everyone, as I am sure you can imagine!

We have the honour and privilege of presenting a selection of our prize winners appearing here tonight to entertain you, our directors, past presidents, members and guests. Please give them a huge warm welcome and enjoy the wonderful quality of their performances.

The Bridgeton Burns Club's founding fathers would be so proud that the Schools Competition is still going strong after 145 years. So please help us to keep this fantastic Competition vibrant, to develop more young talent to come along and entertain us all at next year's Dinner, and most importantly, to send another half a thousand and more youngsters home with big smiles on their faces in December!


