- To promote the life and works of Robert Burns amongst the children of the schools in the East-end of Glasgow by holding an annual competition.



JOHN SHIRKIE, GEORGE MCNEILL & CHARLIE NEWLANDS



JOHN SHIRKIE

John Shirkie was born in Tarbolton in 1957 and from the day he started primary school was completely immersed in the works of Robert Burns. He moved to Mauchline in 1969, where he met and married his wife Celia. They have a son, Steven and a daughter Lorna. John currently works as Senior Infrastructure Technician for Network Rail and lists among

his hobbies, golf, football and student of Robert Burns. John is both a Past Captain and club champion of Ballochmyle Golf Club and with a new knee fitted just recently hopes to return to those heady heights again.

As the Secretary and Past Master of Lodge St James (Kilwinning) Tarbolton No 135, the lodge of Robert Burns, he regularly hosts visits to the lodge museum where some incredible and priceless Burns memorabilia are on display.

In 2009, the 250th anniversary of the birth of the bard, John took part in a BBC programme highlighting the life and works of Burns. He is very pro-active in ensuring the continuation and success of the primary school Burns competitions in Mauchline, Tarbolton and the surrounding areas.

John has spoken numerous times in far off and wonderful places but was particularly honoured to be asked to do the Immortal Memory, on this day last year, to a very select and intimate gathering at Burns cottage in Alloway.

GEORGE McNEILL

George started his sporting career as a professional footballer playing part time with Hibs, Morton & Stirling Albion.

He gave up his football to concentrate on athletics. Because he had signed professional forms as a footballer, he was banned from running as an amateur. He therefore had to concentrate on the professional running circuit.

He started by winning the 1970 centenary "Powderhall Sprint" in Edinburgh, which is the oldest and most renowned professional race.

After his victory at Powderhall he continued to improve to world class times and in August of 1970 he set a new professional world record for 120 yards at the press charities sports at Meadowbank Stadium in Edinburgh.

On January 1st 1971 he ran 110 metres in 11.00 sec's which Equates to around 10 seconds for the more popular 100 metres.

In 1972 he won the world professional sprint title when he defeated Olympic gold medallist Tommie Smith in a four race series at Wakefield. Throughout the seventies he continued to run on the relatively small highland games circuit in Scotland as well as travelling to the more lucrative professional scene in Australia.

George went on to win the biggest professional race in the world in 1981, when he won the "Stawell Gift" in Australia. By coincidence this was also in its centenary year.

Throughout his career he also had to run the small family business where his training as a chartered quantity surveyor was put to good use. Since retiring from athletics George has involved himself with coaching football teams such as Heart Of Midlothian and currently Livingston F.C.

George is a very popular and more than accomplished after dinner speaker and I am delighted that he is joining us tonight.

CHARLIE NEWLANDS

Born in Glasgow in 1944 Charlie has been married to June for 50 years and is the proud father of 4 sons and grandfather to 11 grandchildren.

After leaving Shawlands Academy in 1961 he went to work in the building trade where he remained until his retirement in 2011.

It is his commitment to charity work that sets him apart. Charlie has been the secretary of Enable Renfrew for the past 46 years and was made an Honorary Life Member of Enable Scotland in 2012. He has been heavily involved and participated in the building of a hospital and primary school in Sierra Leone and regularly receives letters from the children of the school addressed to 'Grandpa Charlie'. Charlie received accolade of the Renfrew Citizen of the Year in 1993 and was awarded the MBE in 2004 for services to the town of Renfrew.

A Past President of Glasgow and District Burns Association, Past President of Glasgow Haggis Club and of course Past President of Bridgeton Burns Club, Charlie still manages to find the time to do some public speaking and entertaining with his guitar.

When I joined Bridgeton Burns' Club, I was told that it was a Club like no other. So it proved to be. Among the many tales I have been told is that Bridgeton is a Club that always tries to provide support to kindred Clubs. This comes in many forms, one of the principal being the provision of speakers, reciters or singers for other Burns Suppers and Dinners. The Club Secretary, Iain "Abdul" Gordon sent out an e-mail in mid January to all Board members asking of they were available to speak at a dinner on Saturday 28th January 2017. This told all board members two things, either Big Iain did not fancy it, or he was already booked (it transpired the latter was true). I was speaking at a local supper on the Friday, but had nothing in the diary for the Saturday, so I replied stating that I was available. Iain duly passed my name and contact to the person who enquired, who resided in Glasgow. My next contact was from the Club Treasurer, Robert Lettington. He was delighted I could manage and asked if I has recently taken a course of treatment for malaria! He explained that the Supper was for the Caledonian Society of Kenya, to be held in the Muthaiga Club in Nairobi. So first I got cover for my Friday engagement, sorted out leave at work, checked with the wife (thanks Jo) that I could go - three days later the tickets were emailed, and we were off.

I left Edinburgh on a delayed flight due to the ground crew having to de-ice the wings, early on Friday. This delay meant we were late into Doha, and missed the connecting flight, but were rushed by taxi to a sumptuous hotel and enjoyed little more than a quick sleep, a shower and the most amazing middle Eastern buffet I have ever seen. Quick e-mail to the guys in Nairobi to inform them of the delay. If the next flight is cancelled, and I have to get the one after, I arrive only 2 hours before the dinner! We get there early in the morning, so I opt not to sleep, and we go straight to Muthaiga, and help the committee to set up the room. Dressed in tartan, with the clan crests of the former Society Chieftans around the room, we are done in jig time. We retire for a beer and bite of lunch.

Back to Robert's, his wife is unable to make it, she works in Geneva at the moment. Quick change and back to the Club. I am introduced to a very nervous American guest, it it her first ever Burns' Supper, she is replying on behalf of the Lasses. The piper is a Scot, and in his late 70s, he tells me the problems of piping at high altitude, "thin air, you need to blaw harder." He is joined in piping by my host Robert.

My Immortal Memory is well received, and the rest of the evening is superb. The meal, the toasts, the singing and the hospitality.

We get back late and I sleep long in the morning, Robert returns after lunch having been back to the Club and returned the room to normality. I spend a few short days in Nairobi, taking in the railway museum (my late father worked at the Inverurie Loco Works), the David Sheldrick Wildlife Trust (where they rear and release into the wild again orphan elephants), a park breeding two types of endangered giraffes at Lang'ata, and the Karen Blixen Museum, from Out of Africa.

I returned overnight on the Tuesday, back at work Wednesday morning. The summary – "the experience of a lifetime", thank you Abdul, thanks to you the Bridgeton Burns' Club, the best Burns' Club in the world. It was an honour to represent the Club abroad.

My Father Was A Farmer

On Sunday 29th October, thirty-three members and friends participated in the Club's annual outing, this year to that most quintessential of Burns locations, Mossgiel Farm, where he wrote so many of his most famous poems and the bulk of his Kilmarnock edition: poems such as 'To a Mouse', 'The Twa Dogs', 'The Cotter's Saturday Night', 'To a Louse', 'Holy Willie's Prayer' and many more. The Bard was 'Rab Mossgiel'. (His father had died and Rab was the owner and manager). Mossgiel lies between Mauchline and Tarbolton. Sadly, today, it is no longer a working farm but the Club was allowed to wander round the old outhouses which Rab would have used and to observe the adjacent field where he penned 'To a Mouse'.

Before the farm visit, we visited the Burns Monument on the outskirts of Mauchline, a red sandstone tower from the top of which one has a panoramic view of 'Burns Country'. Next to the Monument sit the Jean Armour Burns Cottages, originally built by the Glasgow and District Burns Association for those of the area in need. Mossgiel farm lay half-a-mile further along the road.



The Bridgeton Burns Club was formed in 1870, and the inaugural Schools Competition was two years later in 1872. The Clubs two constitutional objectives are;

1. To celebrate the anniversary of the birthday of Robert Burns.

2. To encourage and cultivate a knowledge of Scotland's National Bard and also of Scottish history and literature in general, by means of a schools competition within the schools of the East End of Glasgow.

The Club has been holding an annual Schools Competition on the first Friday of December for an amazing 146 years. The Club award appropriate prizes for each of the 32 different categories of the Competition at a concert for prize winners. The Concert and Prize-Giving will take place in the Woodside Halls on 2nd March when 20 trophies will be presented along with silver medals for exceptional performances and £3000 of gift vouchers and cheques. The schools put these funds to great use.

The 2017 Schools Competition was held on Friday 1st December in St Mungo's Academy where the Club again enjoyed superb support from Head Teacher Angela Milton, and Morven Weir our dedicated liaison teacher, who, along with 40 senior pupils, and the fantastic facilities management team, really helped the events run smoothly on the night.

The Bridgeton Burns Club had over 450 performers at the December Schools Competition, with over an additional 670 Art & News-Desk competitors, giving us a grand total of over 1,120 entrants from East End Glasgow primary and secondary schools.

Every participant received a medal on the night for taking part, and it was heartening to see so many happy young faces after the Competition, having performed so well, and enjoyed doing so; and to know that, with the support garnered from your donations at our Dinner tonight, we can make nearly half a thousand and more youngsters happy this coming year too.

Our 2016 Competition, build-up sand Prize-Giving have been filmed and made into a short documentary video by young Lewis O'Neil, a St Mungo's Academy pupil. Lewis worked on this video over his 4th and now 5th year in secondary school, and has also edited a short version for you to see tonight. A quite fantastic effort from a young and talented person, about young ant talented people, and what our Competition means to them.

The Committee's first priority and focus is always on what will enhance the enjoyment of the Competition for our young participants.

This year the running costs of the Competition and Concert individually will cost well over £20,000, increasing every year, despite the best efforts and prudence of the Schools Competition Committee in Reviewing and seeking to reduce any cost which does not affect the children, and all of which goes on external Services e.g. bus transport, hall & school hire, prizes, catering for participants accompanists and adjudicators, and administration.

This is a lot of money and can only be raised by the generosity of the people who are here this evening. You are our only source of income, so I would most sincerely request that you dig deep in your pockets and support the children and schools of the east end. Every penny you can spare is needed! The Bridgeton Burns Club is hugely indebted to the 150 people who voluntarily support the Schools Competition, without which we would simply not be able to stage the Competition. These volunteers are drawn from the directors, past-presidents, friends of the club, from the teaching staff and helpers of the participating schools, from the accompanists and adjudicators (some of whom are former competitors).

This year, in addition to another fantastic donation of Tunnock's Carmel Wafers from Tunnock's, the Co-Op has generously agreed to transport our young performers here and home again this evening in their limousines. Help like this is of huge help to our young competitors, and significantly enhances and enriches their enjoyment of the Competition experience, which makes them want to do it all again next time!


➢ PRIZEGIVING & CONCERT 2017 ↔
