


DR JOSEPH MORROW, COLIN BOTFIELD, DENIS REID

DR JOSEPH MORROW



Dr Joseph Morrow has for over 35 years been actively involved in the community and civic life in Dundee and Scotland. He has been involved with numerous charities, community activities and civic duties.

He has been a member of the Faculty of Advocates for some years now and was made QC in 2015, previous to which he was a solicitor both in private practice and in the voluntary sector. He is at present President of the Mental Health Tribunal for Scotland and was appointed as Lord Lyon King of Arms in February 2014. Dr Morrow was also President of the Additional Support

In the past, he has served as a Justice of the Peace for the City of Dundee, sitting from 1984 till 2002. He was also, for 8 years during that period, a member of the Visiting Committees of Her Majesty's Prison Perth and Her Majesty's Prison Friarton. He has in the past been involved in family mediation work and was also a member of the Licensing Committee and Licensing Board of Dundee City Council.

Dr Morrow is a regular lecturer at university courses on mental health and related issues and has recently published a number of articles on the Tribunal. His latest article was published in the Juridical Review and was entitled "Mental Health Tribunal for Scotland – A Therapeutic Approach".

Dr Morrow has also held a number of previous posts in the public sector including from 2001 to 2009 being a member of the board of the Scottish Children's Reporters Administration, and from 2000 to 2008 he was the first chair of the Waterfront Development board in Dundee.

Dr Morrow was a Dundee Councillor for six years and is Chancellor of the Diocese of Moray, Ross and Caithness. He is at present Vice Lord Lieutenant of the City of Dundee. He has over a considerable number of years always responded to the civic and community needs of the City of Dundee and surrounding area.

His personal interests include heraldry and rearing rare breed sheep.

Needs Tribunals for Scotland from September 2011 until March 2014.

Finally, Dr Morrow is also a Trustee of a number of charitable Trusts in Dundee, which distribute considerable sums of money to the good causes within the City.

Dr Morrow was made Commander of the Civil Division of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire (C.B.E.); for public service to Mental Health in January 2018 and is also a Knight of the Most Venerable Order of St John of Jerusalem.

COLIN BOTFIELD



Colin Botfield was born, schooled and dragged up in Bridge of Allan. He is a Chartered Certified Accountant via Napier University and roles in Edinburgh, London and Glasgow and now operates his own practice.

Colin is an officer in the Royal Navy Reserves serving on warships in the Baltic, the Mediterranean as well as closer to home and is now a RNR staff officer at Rosyth and a Training Officer reporting to BRNC Dartmouth. Colin was recently a Trades House Deacon and has been Treasurer of our club since 2014.

Colin speaks regularly (at no fee!) at Burns, Civic and Armed Forces events. Interests include golf, sailing, travel, homes in Bearsden, Spain and Florida and his marriage to Gillian!

DENIS WILLIAM REID



Denis was born in 1946 and brought up in Girvan Ayrshire. His family had a Joiners/Builders/Funeral Directors business in the town which was founded by his great grandfather who was a Town Councillor and founder member of Carrick Burns Club now celebrating its 126th year.

Denis qualified as a Sanitary Inspector with Ayr County Council and finished his Local Government career as Environmental Health Manager with South Ayrshire Council when he retired 17 years ago. He was in involved in Mediaeval Battle Re-enactment for many years and was a founder member and Battle Director of Carrick 800 Battle Re-enactment Society. When he retired from Local Government he started his own Living History business Black Raven Living History portraying 35 famous characters from Scottish History such as Deacon Brodie and King James VI and 1st telling their life stories in costume in half hour presentations. For the next 12 years he worked with Historic Scotland, the National Trust for Scotland, the BBC and various film companies and for two years performed one man shows at Edinburgh Fringe.

Denis is a former President and current long serving Secretary of Carrick Burns Club. He is also Chairman of Friends of Hillcrest a local Charity in Girvan supporting the local Old Folks Retirement home and is also Chairman/Secretary of the Local Carrick Forum Discussion Group. He is a keen model boat builder specialising in Royal Navy warships and the restoration of antique model ships. He is also a keen writer and local historian and former Chairman of Stranraer Writers Club. He has had several articles published including a booklet entitled "Blood Feud of the Kennedies" re-telling several tales of the ancient Kennedy Family of Carrick.

He is married to May and has one son, two daughters, three grandchildren and two step grandchildren.

WILLIAMWOOD PIPE BAND

The Band was formed in 1945, in Clarkston, Glasgow as part of the 128th Glasgow Company, Boys Brigade. There are currently over 60 members in the band covering the age range from eight to mid seventies, with more than 10% female members.

A key tenet of the band's function is the teaching and promotion of Scottish traditional music and culture.

They are a training and competing Band, and compete in both Major Championships and local Highland Games competitions. In addition, they play at Fetes, Dinners, Parades, Concerts, and have played in many countries including Germany, Spain, Denmark, Africa and the USA. At home they are regularly requested by Glasgow City Council to play in George's Square on St. Andrews Day and Hogmanay. The Band is a non-funded organisation. Their income is derived from subscriptions, fundraising, appearance money, prize money, and the occasional sponsorship or donation.

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₹ FUND FOR THE ARTS

Summer 2018 saw the end of studies for three long-term bursary holders who had successfully graduated plus one single grant. Interviews for the next crop of bursary holders were held in October. As a result, Ellie Forrester who has won several singing prizes in the Schools Competition, has been granted a full bursary for her planned Music studies at either the Royal Scottish Conservatoire, the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester or the Royal Conservatoire of Birmingham. Ellie is planning to study classical singing.

A bursary was also granted to Sean McNamara, a former Verse Speaking winner in the Schools Competition, for his final year of an Acting degree. A one-off grant was also awarded to Sean and a fellow student to enable them to write and rehearse a play, which they plan to take on tour in village halls around Scotland before appearing on the Edinburgh Fringe.

The FFA Committee, with Board approval, has agreed to offer a grant to Lewis O'Neil although he will be pursuing a degree in IT subjects. This is in recognition of the superb video made by Lewis on the work of the Bridgeton Burns Club, which was screened at last year's Anniversary Dinner to great acclaim.

The Committee is currently awaiting a grant application from Gregor McMillan, a past winner of the Boys Solo Singing.

The FFA Committee is extremely grateful to all sponsors, donors and fund-raisers who make the Club's bursaries possible. Rest assured, our bursaries are a sound investment in Scotland's cultural future.


CLUB ANNUAL OUTING REPORT

The Bridgeton Burns Club was formed in 1870, and the inaugural Schools Competition was two years later in 1872. The Clubs two constitutional objectives are;

- 1. To celebrate the anniversary of the birthday of Robert Burns.
- 2. To encourage and cultivate a knowledge of Scotland's National Bard and also of Scottish history and literature in general, by means of a schools competition within the schools of the East End of Glasgow.

The Club has been holding an annual Schools Competition on the first Friday of December for an amazing 146 years. The Club award appropriate prizes for each of the 32 different categories of the Competition at a concert for prize winners. The Concert and Prize-Giving will take place in Kings Park Church on 22nd February when 20 trophies will be presented along with silver medals for exceptional performances and £3000 of gift vouchers and cheques. The schools put these funds to great use.

The 2018 Schools Competition was held on Friday 7th December in St Mungo's Academy where the Club again enjoyed superb support from Head Teacher Angela Milton, and Morven Weir our dedicated liaison teacher, who, along with 40 senior pupils, and the fantastic facilities management team, really helped the events run smoothly on the night.

The Bridgeton Burns Club had over 450 performers at the December Schools Competition, with over an additional 670 Art & News-Desk competitors, giving us a grand total of over 1,120 entrants from East End Glasgow primary and secondary schools.

Every participant received a medal on the night for taking part, and it was heartening to see so many happy young faces after the Competition, having performed so well, and enjoyed doing so; and to know that, with the support garnered from your donations at our Dinner tonight, we can make nearly half a thousand and more youngsters happy this coming year too.

The Committee's first priority and focus is always on what will enhance the enjoyment of the Competition for our young participants.

This year the running costs of the Competition and Concert individually will cost well over £20,000, increasing every year, despite the best efforts and prudence of the Schools Competition Committee in Reviewing and seeking to reduce any cost which does not affect the children, and all of which goes on external Services e.g. bus transport, hall & school hire, prizes, catering for participants accompanists and adjudicators, and administration.

This is a lot of money and can only be raised by the generosity of the people who are here this evening. You are our only source of income, so I would most sincerely request that you dig deep in your pockets and support the children and schools of the east end. Every penny you can spare is needed!

The Bridgeton Burns Club is hugely indebted to the 150 people who voluntarily support the Schools Competition, without which we would simply not be able to stage the Competition. These volunteers are drawn from the directors, past-presidents, friends of the club, from the teaching staff and helpers of the participating schools, from the accompanists and adjudicators (some of whom are former competitors).

This year, in addition to another fantastic donation of Tunnock's Carmel Wafers from Tunnock's, Janice Stevens Independent Funeralcare has generously agreed to transport our young performers here and home again this evening in their limousines. Help like this is of huge help to our young competitors, and significantly enhances and enriches their enjoyment of the Competition experience, which makes them want to do it all again next time!


