Dear Members and Guests

It is my great privilege and pleasure as President of the Bridgeton Burns Club to give you a very warm welcome to the 151st Anniversary Dinner here in the Marriott Hotel Glasgow. This wonderful club was instituted in 1870 with the main objectives being;

- To celebrate the life and works of Robert Burns by holding a dinner each year on the 25th January.
- To promote the life and works of Robert Burns amongst the children of the East-End of Glasgow by holding an annual competition.

The last two years or so has been a terrible ordeal for all in society. People from every walk of life have been affected by the Covid 19 Pandemic, and my heart goes out to those who either lost loves ones, or had relatives or friends suffer in this tragic situation. Due to the forced postponement from the traditional date, I am extremely grateful to the Management of the Marriott Hotel who kindly agreed for the club to reschedule the Anniversary Dinner to this evening.

I am deeply honoured, that on this occasion of the Anniversary Dinner, despite all the uncertainty surrounding our event, the Bridgeton Burns Club will, we believe for the first time in our history, we have those in office of 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Citizens of Glasgow together as guests at our top table. They are the Right Honourable Lord Provost of Glasgow Philip Braat, the Vice Lord Dean of Guild Andrew McFarlane, and the Deacon Convenor of the Trades House Bruce Reidford.

The school's competition which is normally held at St Mungo Academy where around 1000 children from all participating schools gather, compete, and perform songs, recitations, choral verse, art and news desk unfortunately could not take place in that format due to the Covid 19 pandemic protocols which were in place. However, I am glad to say that the schools' competition did take place by virtual technology. A huge thanks goes to the School Teachers, Adjudicators and Members of the Schools Committee headed by Convenor Jonathan Buchan, and of course the excellent children who performed under very unusual circumstances.

Tonight, we have the pleasure of seeing and hearing a selection of the competition winners and a successful student who was a recipient of a Bridgeton Burns Club bursary.

In chairing this prestigious event, I would like to take this opportunity to thank every one of you for your continued support. The long-lasting success of the Bridgeton Burns Club is due to the sustained commitment of its Board of Directors and Past Presidents, who work tirelessly to maintain our high standards. In the last year with many difficult restrictions, the club still managed to hold several social activities, such as a Board Burns Supper in July 2021, to commemorate the passing of the Bard, as there was no Anniversary Dinner. The Annual Golf competition was held at Ralston Golf Club, and after our monthly meetings there was several excellent Burns lectures, presentations and singing performances by Burnsian Archie Chalmers and professional singers Alan and Polly Beck.

The appeal on behalf of the club will be delivered tonight by Past President Alasdair Ronald, and I would be extremely grateful if you would listen carefully to his address, as this is a very important part of the evening for the club.

It is with great sadness that I must report the passing of the club's Honorary President Ian Alistair Macpherson MBE. Ian was a member of the club for 53 years and was President in 1982-83. A wonderful ambassador and stalwart of the club, he will be sadly missed by all who knew him.

Members and Guests, we have a fabulous line-up of entertainment for you tonight, can I ask that you sit back, relax, and enjoy the best Burns Supper in the world.

REVEREND ALEC SHUTTLEWORTH



Alec Shuttleworth is a Dumfriesshire man who grew up singing, reciting and speaking at Burns Suppers. As Minister of Tarbolton Parish Church from 2004 to 2013, the highlight of his Burns career thus far, has been proposing the Immortal Memory at the famous Bachelor's Club in Tarbolton. After University in Edinburgh, Alex joined Radio Forth in 1981, but left his career as an award-winning broadcaster in 1996 to train for the Church of Scotland Ministry, and is currently the Minister of the villages

of Kincardine and Saline in Fife. He sings with the Church of Scotland Heart and Soul Swing Band, enjoys photography and walking, is married with three adult children and twa dugs.

IAIN T. GORDON



Born in Pollok on the south side of Glasgow where he attended Crookston Castle Secondary.

Started off a career as a Civil Engineer then decided it wasn't for him and joined Strathclyde Police in 1979. Posted to Govan working in uniform and plain clothes; promoted to Sergeant at Greenock in 198.7

Promoted Inspector at Saltcoats then three years later moved back to Headquarters in Glasgow.

Promoted Chief Inspector working in Johnstone and then Superintendent and Head of the Media Office. No, it wasn't interference on the television it was actually him!

After almost 5 years returned to Greenock in late 2000 as Superintendent in Charge of Inverclyde Sub-Division.

Appointed Deputy Divisional Commander at 'K' Division, Paisley, before moving to Headquarters as Officer in Charge of Specialist Operations at Police Headquarters, Glasgow. This involved responsibility for the Support Unit, Firearms Unit, Road Policing, Marine Policing, Air Support (Force Helicopter), Mounted Branch, Dog Branch, VIP Protection, Emergencies Planning and Major Event Planning – in other words all the toys!

Working at Divisional HQ at Govan, he was regularly Ground Commander at Ibrox Stadium. Retired from Strathclyde Police in 2010 after 31 years.

He is married and lives in the Southside of Glasgow, has two grown–up children, Graeme (34) and Lynsey (32)and a beautiful Granddaughter, Lexie, born in December 2020. Hobbies – Past Captain of Ralston Golf Club, handicap of 12 (If anyone can work out the new WHS!) and getting higher, Member of The Irvine Golf Club (Bogside), keeping fit, listening to music, visiting good restaurants, travelling and reading.

ALAN D. BECK



Tenor Alan Beck studied at the Royal Scottish Academy of Music and Drama (now the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland). He later won the entrance scholarship to the Postgraduate Opera Course at the Royal Northern College of Music. In 1995 Alan won the British Wagner Society Singing Competition at Covent Garden and was subsequently awarded the society's Bayreuth Bursary. Later that year, he also won the

Wolfgang Wagner Singing Competition in London in front of Dr Wagner and Dame Gwyneth Jones.

He made his operatic début in 1995 for Opera Ireland and was a principal tenor with the State Opera, Stuttgart from 1996 to 2002, singing many roles in the German and central European repertoire. Alan has also sung principal tenor roles for Lyric Opera Dublin and the Carl Rosa Opera and in 2002 he made his début as Siegmund in Wagner's Die Walküre at the London Coliseum for English National Opera. Most recently he has been busy singing with Welsh National Opera as Bacchus in Strauss' Ariadne auf Naxos and appearing as Eisenstein in Haddo House Opera's 60th anniversary production of Die Fledermaus.

Alan has sung all over the world in cities such as Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Perth, Wellington, Christchurch, Aukland, New York, Chicago, Detroit, Tampa, Houston, Vancouver, Winnepeg, Toronto, Mexico City, Santo Domingo, Aviles, Berlin, Munich, Leipzig, Vilnius, Brussels, Vienna, Budapest, Belfast, London and all over Scotland.

Alan has taught singing for many years for organisations such as the Junior RNCM (where he also directed the choir), the Junior RCS and NYCoS, and he is currently the Vocal Coach for the Scottish Chamber Orchestra Chorus).

Alan is a Past-President of Greenock Burns Club (The Mother Club) and is currently Senior Vice-President of the Robert Burns World Federation. He lives in Greenock with his wife Polly and their two sons, Adam and Reuben.




Glasgow Life and The Mitchell Library will benefit from this enhancement of a resource which they hold. This will be an exemplary project and will create interest through the World Burns Federation, National Records of Scotland & various Scottish Government agencies that recognise the worth of historical information. The social and cultural history of Bridgeton Burns Club and Glasgow Life, particularly the east end of Glasgow, Scotland, and the worldwide Burns movement, from an international dimension, will all have further light shed upon them. This is also a path-breaking initiative, post-covid 19 pandemic, in digital curation of local associational culture of National & International significance. Enhanced curation & worldwide public access to an important 19th-21st century archive. Acting now to ensure appropriate heritage legacy for future generations.

It will commence early in the New Year 2022, with a pilot scheme to allow an assessment of the smooth access and working relationship between all parties. 

ờ Fund for the Arts 🐔

The Fund for the Arts provides grants to pupils pursuing artistic interests and annual bursaries to students pursuing careers in the Arts. It is entirely inclusive, the only stipulation being that the applicant lives in the Club's catchment area in the East End of Glasgow, preference being given to pupils who have shown commitment in the Schools Competition. The current bursaries are for £700 p.a.

The Fund was inaugurated by the late Hon President Walter Hibberd but has now merged with the Club's main account. It depends therefore on a minor share of donations gathered at the Anniversary Dinner. Since its creation, it has assisted twenty students through university, college and other art schools ranging from Guildford to Skye. Currently, the Fund is helping five students at the Royal Scottish Conservatoire, the Royal Northern School of Music (Manchester) and the MGA Academy of Performing Arts in Edinburgh.

Our latest bursary holder, Amber Blake, won two Club silver medals at Calderwood Primary, was first winner of the Willie Telfer Trophy and performed on the fiddle at the Club's Anniversary Dinner in 2012 (see photo below). That experience convinced her that she should make a career in Scottish traditional music. Ten years later (see photo below), she is studying for an Honours degree in Gaelic and Traditional Music at Sabhal Mòr Ostaig in Skye, a faculty of the University of the Highlands and Islands, with the help of a bursary from the Club's Fund for the Arts. When recently she was gifted a fiddle dated 1784, once played by the legendary Scottish fiddler Neil Gow, the Fund also gave her a one-off grant to buy a top-of-range protective case for it. Robert Burns, a fiddler himself, travelled to Aberfeldy to meet Gow, and while there wrote 'The Birks o' Aberfeldy'.

Helping students is an act of faith. The Club simply hopes that they will carry forward Scotland's artistic heritage, in particular the Burns heritage, into future generations. As beneficiaries are not tracked beyond graduation, it is difficult to gauge the return on this investment. However, some feedback is possible. Ryan Sullivan (St Andrews Secondary) was a multiple Club silver medallist and awarded a bursary while studying at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland. He graduated in 2015 with First Class Honours and then embarked on an international teaching career. To quote Ryan:

'I had four great years at RCS and was lucky to win a lot of prizes and awards: the RSNO Concerto Prize, a place in the London Symphony Orchestra Academy, finalist in the Yamaha Music Foundation of Europe Scholarship, Highly Commended in the Governors' Prize. Some of my best memories are from playing in the orchestra for the Mozart operas. It doesn't get better than that. Glasgow was a vibrant and diverse place to study. Its artistic landscape is a chapter in itself. The character of its people is another. It's all of these things that make Glasgow stand out from the crowd compared to any major European city.'

The highly musical Logan family gathered a host of Club silver medals whilst at St Mungo's Academy and duly received bursaries and grants for their ongoing musical activity. In recent years, the sisters have formed a professional singing group (Google: the logans band of sisters). As a fifth-year pupil, Tayler wowed the audience at the Anniversary Dinner in 2013 with the Club's first ever 'Reply from the Lassies'.

This evening we shall be entertained by the professional flautist, Kerry Lynch. When Kerry was a pupil at St Andrews Secondary, the Club funded the purchase of her first flute. She and her Italian partner, classical guitarist Jacopo Lazzaretti, have just launched their first EP based on the music of Robert Burns. You are about to experience the return on that investment.

'The International Poet' is the debut EP/Album of the JKL Duo, comprising Scottish flautist Kerry Lynch, and Italian classical guitarist Jacopo Lazzaretti.



The entire project is a homage to Robert Burns but with an international twist, calling on the native musical cultures of other countries around the globe, and merging them with that of Scotland's in an attempt to envision the kinds of works Burns may have created had he been alive today when physical distance is no longer the barrier it once was to artistic collaboration.

The pair have been working closely over the past two years with the project's eight composers to create the album that is being released in June 2022. They will then take their album on a UK/International tour, bringing their music to Scotland's concert venues and those in the countries of their composers.

Various stages of the project have been generously supported by organisations such as: 'The Jean Armour Burns Trust', 'The Calgary Burns Club', 'The Make It Happen Fund (The Royal Conservatoire of Scotland)' and 'The North East Scotland Classical Guitar Society'. Kerry and Jacopo are now seeking help from Burns music lovers to assist them financially in the recording and mastering stages of the album's creation.




The 'On The Bard' slot on 1st February 2022 was a presentation by the Club Secretary Marc Sherland on Robert Burn's connection with the area of Kilmarnock.

A fascinating and informative presentation into a number of very influential members of society who made a great impression on the bard. In particular, were the brothers Hugh and William Parker, who were Bankers and had a street named after them in the town. The publication of the Kilmarnock Edition of 612 copies was explained in great detail, resulting in the assistance and help of these men, along with others, including the printer John Wilson. An excellent presentation.

COLIN RAE BROWN BICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION

Bridgeton Burns Club members attended this prestigious event at Greenock Town Hall on 13 November 2021, which was hosted by the Greenock Burns Club. Colin Rae Brown a Past President of the Mother Club, was a giant in the Burns Movement in the 19th Century, being instrumental in the organisation of the National Burns Demonstration of 1844, as well as being the inspiration for the foundation of the Burns Federation, the Burns Chronicle, founder of the Burns Club of London and responsible for many of the statues and monuments of Burns and other famous Scots. A remarkable man who devoted and dedicated the vast majority of his time to Burns, ensuring that scholars throughout the world read and learned about the wonderful works of the Bard.











'UP IN THE MORNING EARLY'
